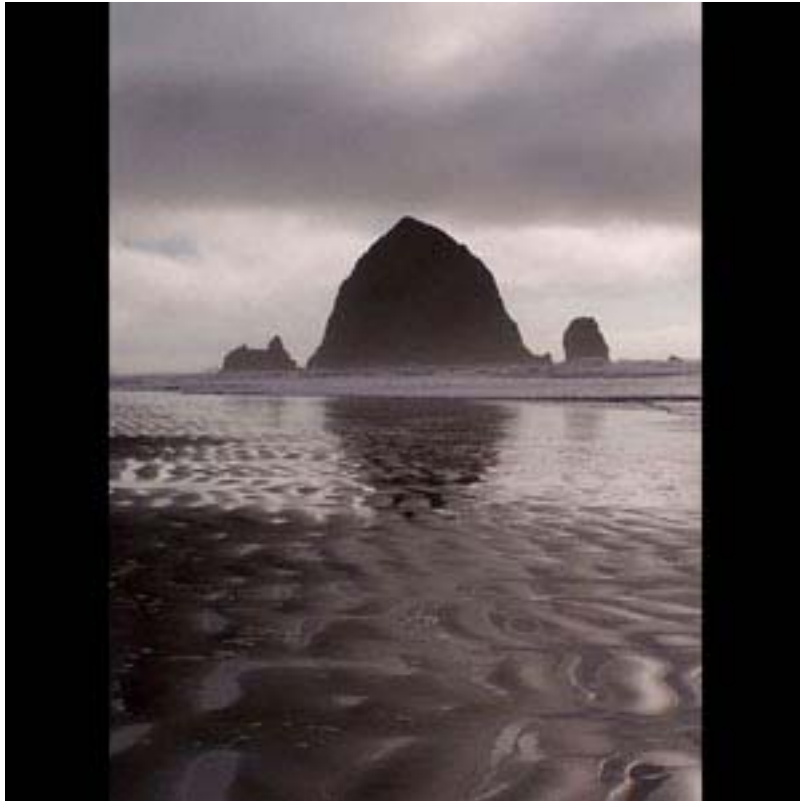
Isolated and alone

**Tuesday, March 9, 2010**



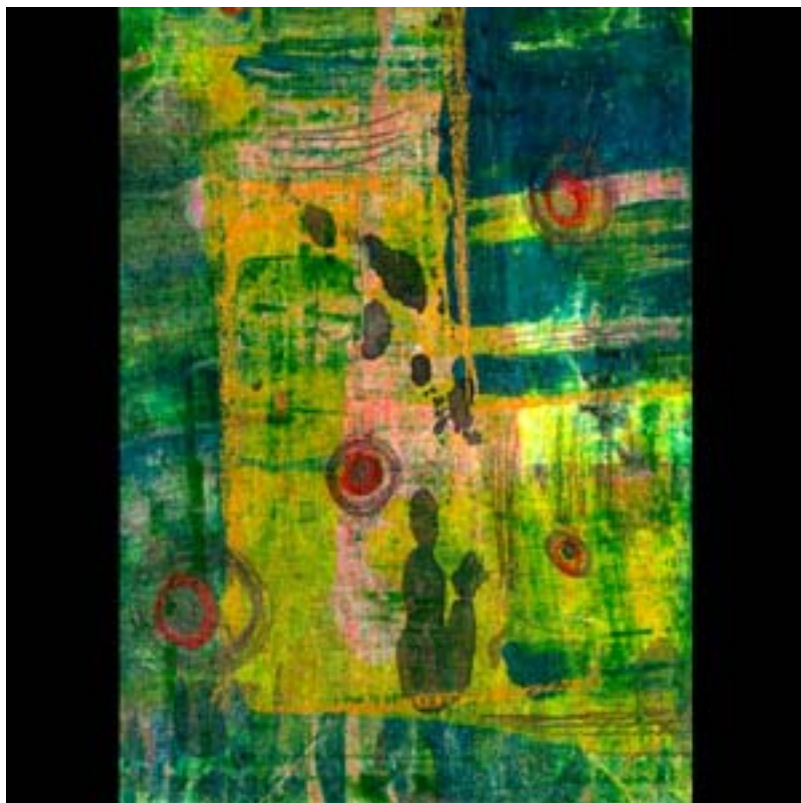
